Dear IMAA Members,

It is an honor to serve the Association as our 2012 President. On behalf of the Association, I would like to thank Tom Nugent, Immediate Past President, for his leadership during the previous year.

OBITUARY — LARRY BROST OF STONE-STREET QUARRIES



LARRY "The LEGEND" BROST, 69, of Fort Wayne, died on Saturday, Feb. 25, 2012, at his residence. Born Aug. 17, 1942, in Lafayette, he was the son of the late Arthur and Cecilia Brost. He was President of Stone - Street Quarries from 1983 until his retirement in 2008; he worked at Western Indiana Aggregates, Lafayette from 1965 to 1973; and was V.P. of Operations at May Stone & Sand, where he worked from 1973 to 1986. He graduated from Ambia High School, Ambia, Ind., in 1960. He then graduated from St. Joseph College, Rensselaer, Ind., 1963. He went on to get his Civil Engineering degree from Purdue University. He served as President of Indiana Mineral Aggregates Association in 1994. He received the Keystone Award in 2005 from IMAA and was inducted into the IMAA Hall of Fame in 2009. He was a member of St. Charles Borromeo Catholic Church and Fraternal order of the Elks. "He loved his family, his many friends, and the game of golf." Surviving are his wife, Millie; daughters, Tricia (Nate) McCrillis of Noblesville and Stacy (Tony) Amstutz of Fort Wayne; son, Nik Brost of Fort Wayne; grandchildren, Jacob, Andrew and Kaitlyn Amstutz, Quinten and Anastasia McCrillis; brothers, Ron (Nancy) Brost of Otterbein, Gerry (Phyllis) Brost of Lafayette, John (Cheryl) Brost of Oxford, and Rick Brost of Indianapolis; sister-in-law, Mary Brost of Lafayette; brother-in-law, Mike Hardebeck of Earl Park, Ind.; and 23 nieces and nephews. He was also preceded in death by his sister, Daine Hardebeck; and brother, Jim Brost. Burial in St. Mary's Cemetery, Dunnington, Ind. IMAA'S ROBERT G. JONES IS NSSGA'S 2011 STATE AGGREGATES ASSOCIATION EXECUTIVE OF THE YEAR

Robert G. Jones, executive director of the Indiana Minerals Aggregates Association, Carmel, Ind., has been named NSSGA's 2011 State Aggregates Association Executive of the Year. MSHA'S JOE MAIN DEFENDS AGENCY ENFORCEMENT TO HOUSE MEMBERS

In response to a letter from Rep. Robert Hurt (R-Va.) and co-signed by 17 other members of Congress concerning inconsistent enforcement by U.S. Mine Safety and Health Administration inspectors, MSHA Administrator Joe Main defended the agency's inspectorate. The response seemed to offer few if any signals that the agency is planning any changes. This is important to aggregates operators because MSHA's enforcement has been a bone of contention for the past five years.

The congressmen asked about ways in which MSHA trains inspectors, as well as about the degree of flexibility inspectors have in determining a penalty amount for violations of the Mine Act. Also, the congressmen asked about the impending rule proposal on civil penalties.

Main responded by explaining the new program pre-penalty conferencing, as well as training for field office supervisors and outreach to industry. He mentioned such safety initiatives as new guarding guidance, which Main asserted contributed to a 26% reduction in violations of guarding standards from 2011 compared to the year-earlier level. He also credited the "Safety Pro in a Box" program established through the MSHA-NSSGA Alliance.

Main called attention to the work of the Small Mines Office to assist operators, and went on to write that he respects the "vital role" played by the industry, and that it is not MSHA's intent to use enforcement authority to cause undue financial hardship, or to limit employment opportunities of miners.

NSSGA will continue to work with Congress to ensure oversight of MSHA activities so that the agency is on notice that Congress is watching.

BILLS OF INTEREST PASSED DURING SHORT 2012 SESSION

A number of other bills passed during the 2012 session are of interest to the construction industry. Unless otherwise noted, all changes take effect on July 1, 2012. Among those most directly impacting construction are:

SB 98 – Authorizes counties to use property taxes and miscellaneous revenue for the maintenance of county highways.

HB 1163 – This bill affects procedures for filing a claim against the general contractor onstate and local public works contracts, except for INDOT. The changes make claim procedures consistent for state and local contracts and will require a subcontractor or supplier to deliver a copy of the claim to the general contractor not later than 60 days after the last work on that contract by that subcontractor or supplier. Claims would also have to be filed with the public body not later than 60 days after the last work was performed by the person or company filing the claim. A suit may not be brought against a surety on a bond until 30 days after the required notice has been submitted to the public body and a copy of the notice has been delivered to the contractor. The bill also reduces the amount of retainage the Indiana Department of Administration (IDOA) can hold upon substantial completion of a contract from 400 percent of remaining uncompleted minor items to 200 percent. IDOA can also withhold amounts of unresolved claims.

What is the IMAA Teachers' Workshop?

This workshop is specially created for K-12 science educators in Indiana. The workshop will focus on the identification, economic value, and the uses of a variety of rocks and minerals in everyday life. Volunteers from the aggregates mining industry also provide expert knowledge on mining procedures in Indiana. Remember: if it can't be grown, it must be mined!

How does the Workshop operate?

The teachers will not be sitting through boring seminars all day! The IMAA Teachers' Workshop uses hands-on sessions to present activities that teachers can take back to the classroom, with helpful tips on how the activities can be worked into their curriculums.

There are also two field trips to active aggregate mining operations, where on-site instruction will be provided concerning extraction technology, quality control and how the aggregates industry addresses environmental issues.

Is professional credit available for attending?

All participants will receive 9 Professional Growth Points for attending the entire workshop. Teachers can also apply to receive 1 graduate credit hour from the Indiana University School of Education at an additional cost (\$377.66 for IU graduate credit hour). All paperwork to receive the graduate credit will be available at the beginning of the workshop and will be due on the final day of the workshop (6/28/12). Payment will be billed at a later date. All teachers should contact Walt Gray (grayw@indiana.edu), Educational Outreach Coordinator for the Indiana Geological Survey with any questions regarding the IU graduate credit.

What is the cost of attending?

The registration fee for the IMAA Teachers' Workshop is \$55.00. Registration is limited to 60 participants. The IU graduate credit is optional and is an additional fee of \$377.66.

IMAA has also secured rooms at the Cambria Suites at I-69 and 146th in Noblesville at a special rate for the Teachers' Workshop. The rate flyer for the special room rates is available on the IMAA website. The deadline to reserve rooms in the room block is June 8, 2012. \$55.00 is a small fee to pay for the impact a teacher will have on a child or parent's opinion of the mining industry.
