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## NALC PLANS TO OPEN SECOND LIMESTONE QUARRY NEAR CLOVERDALE, INDIANA

NALC plans to invest \$5 million to establish a second limestone quarry and fine-grind facility in Cloverdale, Ind., just a half mile from its current 174-acre operation. Inside Indiana Business reports that the new 181-acre site will extract and process high calcium carbonate limestone, which has a variety of uses, including animal feed, fertilizer, glass manufacturing, and more. The new quarry and fine-grind operation is expected to be operating by October. The company, which currently employs nearly 30 people, plans to create up to 15 new jobs by 2016. Those who would like to apply for administrative, equipment operator, and quality control positions may do so at the company's Cloverdale campus. Hiring is expected to begin this summer.

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# COMMITTEE REPORTS

## SAFETY COMMITTEE

### LYME DISEASE SEASON – A TIP FROM YOUR IMAA SAFETY COMMITTEE

*Borrelia burgdorferi*, or "Lyme Disease." Miners exposed to the woods, tall grass, and rural outdoors are exposed to the various species of ticks.

What are the signs and symptoms of Lyme disease? Remember, there are two stages: early-stage and late-stage signs and symptoms.

**Early Stage** – curable: Symptoms may appear from 4 hours to several weeks after an infected tick, mosquito, biting fly, flea, or mite bite:

- Flu like symptoms – fatigue, joint pain, headache, fever, chills, swollen glands, sore throat, stiff neck. Symptoms may move around the body with the only consistency being a lack of consistency. You may have flu-like symptoms one day, and fatigue, or muscle and joint pain a few days later.
- Only 1/3 of infected people may have a rash or a bull's eye rash. {Take a photo of the rash- to show your doctor- a rash may come and go!}

**Late Stage** (Chronic Lyme) – incurable: These symptoms may occur weeks, months, and even years after the bite and the symptoms may come and go. Peak disease is associated with increasing numbers of spirochetes in the tissues while regression follows the antibody response. It is very cyclic and fluctuates in intensity so that symptoms are present on some days and not on others.

Symptoms include:

- Continued flu-like symptoms with swollen glands, low grade fevers
- Depression, psychiatric disorders
- Sensitivity to lights, sounds, motion, odors, blurred vision, or loss of sight
- Cognitive dysfunction, difficulty organizing or making decisions, memory loss
- Muscle pain, weakness, numbness, tingling, motor dysfunction, and paralysis
- Stiff neck, severe headaches, loss of balance, dizziness, poor coordination, Bell's Palsy (facial drooping)
- Irregular heartbeat, palpitations, heart block, chest pain, difficulty breathing
- Tremors, seizures, panic attacks, anxiety, sleep disorders, swollen joints
- Possible death without continued treatment

**Prevention:** Do a daily tick check on children and pets, who play in the yard.

- Perform frequent, thorough tick checks – especially the scalp area
- Wear light colored clothes
- Tuck pants into socks or put duct tape around the cuffs
- Put clothes into dryer for 30 minutes to kill ticks – washing clothes will not kill ticks!
- There are products containing DEET for skin – children 2 months old and older, use a 10% concentration but do not apply to face or hands – adults use 12-25% max.
- There are products containing Permethrin for clothes—do not use on young \*children—is a very effective product for adults and recommended for hunters. Consider using new DEET free repellents 1-800-219-9765 for 8 hours of effectiveness. \* Under 14 years of age.

### Tick Removal

- Don't squeeze, pinch, or twist the body of tick
- Do not burn or use any substance on tick
- Grasp tick's head close to skin with tweezers
- Pull tick straight out in quick motion
- See a physician if unable to remove the whole tick
- Use antiseptic on skin and antibiotic ointment.
- Disinfect your tweezers.
- Wash hands thoroughly.

Always see a physician for possible diagnosis, testing, and treatment. Watch for symptoms or rash that are not normal.

**Prevention is the key.**

### GOVERNOR PENCE NAMES BRANDYE HENDRICKSON COMMISSIONER OF INDIANA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION

**Indianapolis**—Governor Mike Pence today named Brandy Hendrickson as Commissioner of the Indiana Department of Transportation, effective immediately. Governor Pence earlier today accepted Commissioner Karl Browning's resignation.

"With more than a decade of executive experience in state government, Brandy Hendrickson has demonstrated a commitment to public service and a nearly unmatched depth of understanding of the Indiana Department of Transportation," said Governor Pence. "I am confident that she will uphold the agency's mission and serve Hoosiers well as Commissioner."

Since 2007, Hendrickson has served as Deputy Commissioner for the Indiana Department of Transportation, specifically overseeing the agency's Greenfield District Operations which encompasses East Central Indiana, including Indianapolis. In this role, her responsibilities include managing an annual construction budget of approximately \$700 million and an annual operating budget of \$50 million.

Hendrickson oversees a workforce of 360 employees responsible for the planning, design, construction, maintenance and operation of INDOT's transportation infrastructure within the district. In 2013, Governor Pence named her as Interim Commissioner at INDOT, a role she held for seven weeks. Previously, Hendrickson served as Deputy Commissioner for Human Resources within INDOT and more than six years as Human Resources Director for the Indiana Department of Environmental Management.

"I appreciate the opportunity to continue my service to Hoosiers as head of the Indiana Department of Transportation," said Hendrickson. "I look forward to contributing further to the accomplishments of the Pence administration."



## IMAA & IRMCA TOGETHER IN DOWNTOWN INDIANAPOLIS

# NSSGA NEWS

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## CONGRESS PASSES TWO-MONTH HIGHWAY EXTENSION

Congress has voted to extend authorizations for federal highway and transit programs through July 31. Both the House and Senate passed the measure. The new stopgap is the 33rd extension in six years. President Obama is expected to sign the bill before the May 31 deadline.

"The extension keeps existing projects moving forward, which is good, but you can't fund the America's infrastructure two months at a time," said Bailey Wood, National Stone, Sand and Gravel Association (NSSGA) spokesperson. "NSSGA's number-one goal remains a long-term bill with a stable funding stream to effectively grow the economy and create jobs." "We heard a lot from lawmakers today about their support for a long-term highway bill. But actions speak louder than words," said Association of Equipment Manufacturers (AEM) President Dennis Slater. "If Congress wants to demonstrate its commitment to a sustainable solution for the Highway Trust Fund, the House Ways and Means Committee and Senate Finance Committee could start by hosting hearings on the topic of highway financing. Even better would be for leaders in Congress and the Obama administration to produce new, innovative proposals on how they would fund a long-term bill."

"This two month extension is a reflection of the inability of Congress to fund a long-term surface transportation bill, which has caused uncertainty among our members," said Bud Wright, executive director of the American Association of State Highway and Transportation Officials. "State DOTs are already postponing construction projects this year because they can't count on federal funds to be there."

U.S. Chamber President and CEO Thomas J. Donohue called on Congress to "get its head out of a pothole."

"While we recognize that passing a short-term extension of the Highway Trust Fund through July was a necessary action, it was not a sufficient one. Continuing to kick the can down the road when it comes to funding our nation's transportation infrastructure threatens the continuity necessary for economic development, international trade, and job creation.

"We need Congress to get its head out of a pothole and immediately turn to identifying and advancing a bipartisan, sustainable, and long-term solution to the Highway Trust Fund," Donohue said. "By the end of July, Congress must send to the president a measure that generates the cash flows necessary to supporting continued outlays from the Highway Trust Fund, giving businesses the certainty they need to plan for the future.

"The Chamber is urging leaders of both parties to come together and find a shared solution that allows us to work on finding ways to grow investment in transit, roads, and bridges, and enable economic growth and expansion," he concluded.

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## WOTUS RULE EXPANDS EPA AUTHORITY; EXEMPTS QUARRIES

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) released its final "waters of the United States" (WOTUS) rule. In taking this action, EPA greatly expanded its own regulatory authority and created new bureaucratic red tape for many U.S. industrial activities.

"For the water in the rivers and lakes in our communities that flow to our drinking water to be clean, the streams and wetlands that feed them need to be clean too," said EPA Administrator Gina McCarthy. "Protecting our water sources is a critical component of adapting to climate change impacts like drought, sea level rise, stronger storms, and warmer temperatures – which is why EPA and the Army have finalized the Clean Water Rule to protect these important waters, so we can strengthen our economy and provide certainty to American businesses."

"Today's rule marks the beginning of a new era in the history of the Clean Water Act," said Assistant Secretary for the Army (Civil Works) Jo-Ellen Darcy. "This is a generational rule and completes another chapter in history of the Clean Water Act. This rule responds to the public's demand for greater clarity, consistency, and predictability when making jurisdictional determinations. The result will be better public service nationwide."

While EPA is touting the virtues of WOTUS, industry advocates are telling a different story.

"NSSGA members work diligently to protect our nation's water resources, following existing federal, state and local laws. This rule will add significant costs to aggregates producers with little or no environmental benefit," said NSSGA President and CEO Michael W. Johnson. "The increased costs and delays will be passed along to the taxpayers through a higher price tag for infrastructure projects like highways."

"Every avenue open to us to make our voice heard, we took" said NSSGA's Sr. vice president Pam Whitted. "In addition to submitting detailed comments on the rule, NSSGA members and staff met multiple times with EPA officials, the White House and countless members of both the House and Senate to make it clear that the aggregates industry opposed this radical expansion of EPA authority."

One improvement included in the final rule is the clear exclusion of quarry and construction pits that NSSGA specifically

requested. "While we appreciate the clarity for existing operations not being considered waters of the U.S., the agency failed to reduce confusion and add clarity when that was the rule's intended goal," said Johnson.

For example, existing EPA guidance clearly excludes dry streams from the agency's purview. Because these typically dry land features are pervasive on the landscape, particularly in the arid southwest, deeming them waters of the U.S. unnecessarily increases federal jurisdiction over them. The rule also allows for jurisdiction over many ditches, which goes far beyond congressional and court limits.

"What this rule really does is allow federal control over vast areas of land that can stop or delay vital projects needed to provide for our infrastructure," Johnson added.

"This rule will impact a wide range of normal U.S. industrial and agricultural activities, at a time when workers are just getting back on the job after eight years of tough economic times," said James G. Toscas, president and CEO of the Portland Cement Association (PCA). "This is simply the wrong kind of regulation at the wrong time."

Serious concerns were voiced in public comments when this rule was originally proposed. A key concern was that decisions on where the new rule would apply could be made by government officials on a case-by-case basis. EPA said that it addressed the public comments, but the final version of the rule had only cosmetic changes.

"We take environmental compliance very seriously," Toscas continued. "This rule will make it much more difficult for a cement production facility not only to comply, but also to even know whether it is in compliance. We also foresee construction projects being delayed and stalled as contractors struggle to figure out how to comply with complex new requirements that go far beyond anything Congress intended with the Clean Water Act."

In response to public opposition to the WOTUS rule, the House of Representatives overwhelmingly passed bipartisan legislation that requires regulators to work with states, industry, and other stakeholders to develop practical ways to protect water quality. Similar legislation is now pending in the Senate.

"This is yet another example of government overreach that is unlikely to help the environment, but very likely to hurt the economy. Congress is right to send EPA back to the drawing board on this one," said Toscas.

"Instead of reaching a reasonable solution, the EPA has ignored millions of Americans and taken more control over private land in our country," said "Sen. John Barrasso (R-Wyo.) "There is bipartisan agreement that Washington bureaucrats have gone beyond their authority and have no business regulating irrigation ditches, isolated ponds and other 'non-navigable' waters as waters of the United States."

House Agriculture Subcommittee on Conservation and Forestry Chairman, Rep. Glenn 'GT' Thompson (R-Pa.), noted that the Obama Administration has reaffirmed its intentions to unilaterally expand its federal authority by finalizing the Waters of the United States Rule, despite strong bipartisan opposition from Congress, farmers, ranchers, aggregates producers and state and local governments.

"While I agree the statutory boundaries of the Clean Water Act must be more defined, this regulatory action does not move in that direction, but rather creates far more problems than the EPA and Army Corps of Engineers claim it would solve," he said

"Although the Administration has taken this action, I remain committed to solving these challenges through the legislative process."
